
Some time ago the previous owner conducted an emergency braking test on the other side of the Copland Islands, which it passed with flying colours.





## SAFETY MATTERS - NUMBER 1

I wonder when was the last time you checked your life jacket and other safety equipment on your boat? Do you always wear you life jacket when going from the shore to your boat in your dinghy? A certain incident happened in Larne Harbour in May and Sam Andrews our secretary feels it is worth repeating the details for member's consideration.

Neils Fekkes, Hon Sec of the Larne RNLI and his brother Peter were going out in the dinghy to Peter's boat when the outboard fouled on a floating rope resulting in the dinghy being overturned and both men being flung into the sea.

Neils was wearing an automatic life jacket, but to his horror it did not inflate and he was left struggling in a freezing choppy sea. He and his brother were being swept out to sea and after about forty minutes they were spotted by a freight ferry that contacted the local lifeboat by which they were eventually rescued.

Neils later remarked, "I don't think I was ever as cold in all my life". The brothers spend the night in hospital recovering from hypothermia.

When I read of this incident I remembered it was a long time since I checked my own life jacket which is not automatic. Down at the boat when I tried to inflate the life jacket, there was no air in the canister! Where did the air go in a sealed canister? SO be warned! Check those jackets and wear the thing going out to your boat in the harbour. It is quite amazing to note the number of members who get thrown into the water just going to their boat moored in the harbour. {There have been three this season alone!}

### SAFETY MATTERS - NUMBER 2

Fire on board a boat is always a frightening event, as it can spread so quickly and with fuel and cooking gas cylinders on board, the risk of explosion very real. Past Commodore John Bell had this experience while launching Nivram.

While waiting for the rising tide, Nivram was sitting on the trailer waiting for the water to come over the sail drive so that the engine could be started. I was inside the cabin and switched on the batteries prior to turning the key in the ignition. However as it happened I remained in the cabin to watch the voltmeters register the state of the batteries. {I never start the engine until both batteries are at full charge}

Suddenly there was a flash and clouds of intense black smoke plumed out of the engine bay. I quickly switched off the batteries and got out of the cabin immediately. The smoke did not get any worse, so the hatches were taken off the engine to see what had happened. One of the heavy cables had melted meaning that there had been a short circuit some where.

Later examination showed that one of the cables' insulation had worn through, due probably to engine vibration over many years, and the bare wire had touched part of the engine causing the short circuit. I was lucky that it happened while in the relative safety of the harbour but it was a situation that could have happened out at sea. Like Sam's account of the life jackets, when was the last time you checked the wiring in your boat for any potential short circuits? And if the boat did catch fire what is the state of your fire extinguisher? Have you even got one? Have you checked all the fuel and gas fittings for security?

These two incidents are stark reminders that perhaps we take our sailing too casually and we should remind ourselves that checking our equipment every year should be part of our preparations for each season, and to have emergency procedures in place should any potential dangerous situation arise.


